The coloring in ink-color, much like the shading in powder-color, is of utmost importance in the decoration process. A well-executed ink-color piece requires both excellent painting and coloring skills. Ink-color painting techniques vary greatly depending on the subject matter and the materials used. Jingdezhen ink-color porcelain is often decorated on white glazed porcelain, with techniques primarily inspired by Chinese painting and traditional ceramic decorative methods. The porcelain paintings predominantly feature ink tones, harmoniously blending shades with occasional red accents or embellishments. They emphasize fine brushwork and combine various expressive techniques to create elegant, graceful colors, profound meanings, vivid yet simple decorations, and ethereal, clear compositions. Ink-color is said to have "five colors within the ink," with various shades of black producing an elegant, pleasing rhythm and holding high artistic appreciation value. Inkcolor porcelain primarily features vibrant black and borrows techniques from Chinese fine brushwork and ink painting, emphasizing artistic conception, poetic sentiment, calligraphic charm, and seal impressions. Delicate brushes are used to create intricate ink-color patterns on the porcelain. By skillfully utilizing the porcelain's jade-like texture and painting patterns with varying shades of ink, ink-color artistry achieves a sublime artistic realm. Ink-color places great emphasis on fine brushwork, rendering the painting process incredibly intricate. Some works resemble ink paintings on silk or paper, with occasional contrasting touches of light or dark red, harmoniously pairing black, red, and white. The unique aesthetic features of ink-color have garnered admiration worldwide, as evidenced by the Qing Dynasty Yongzheng official kiln inkcolor landscape and figure brush pots housed in the Victoria and Albert Museum in England. These unique pieces feature wood grain texture glaze on the interior and exterior edges, with an ink-color painting of "figures traveling" adorning the middle of the exterior wall, mainly using ink with shades of light ochre and pale brown, resulting in a well-defined and layered painting.

Most ink-color porcelain painters of that era received systematic education and training from art academies, as well as long-term practical training at ceramic art research institutes, factories, and workshops. However, the new generation of ink-color porcelain painters is confronted with the challenge of a dwindling pool of successors, which can be attributed to the current age gap in the ceramic industry's talent structure.
